### **Keynote speaker: Sarah Bingle**

Sarah Bingle currently works at Your DNA Creative Arts and prior to this worked as Casey Cardinia Libraries' Outreach Officer for the Library has Legs, Communities for Children Cranbourne Project. Sarah holds an Honorary position at Melbourne University's Indigenous Health and Equity Unit and runs Arnam Liber- Living Library Heritage consultancy/ Blog. Sarah has over twenty-five years' experience working within the community, health, arts, education and library service sector.

In 2016 Sarah was awarded the State Library Victoria Margery C Ramsay Scholarship for her project 'Strengthening the Cultural Identity of Communities through Libraries' - a multifaceted project incorporating research and action learning, involving a secondment with the Territory Library Service and the team at the Victorian Aboriginal Corporation for Languages to develop a library framework for delivering early years' outreach and community engagement programs to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander families.

#### **Keynote speaker: Alistair Thomson**

Alistair Thomson is a Professor of History at Monash University, current President of Oral History Australia and former President of the International Oral History Association. His research and teaching explores the ways in which life story evidence can illuminate the past and its meanings in the present lives of individuals and society.

His books include:

Anzac Memories: Living With the Legend (1994 and 2013) The Oral History Reader (1998, 2006 and 2016, with Rob Perks) Ten Pound Poms: Australia's Invisible Migrants (2005, with Jim Hammerton) Moving Stories: an intimate history of four women across two countries (2011) Oral History and Photography (2011, with Alexander Freund) Australian Lives: An Intimate History (2017, with Anisa Puri).

#### **Keynote speaker: Adam Ford**

Archaeologist, TV presenter and writer, Adam Ford has led expeditions and explored the stories of our past across the world, giving us valuable insights for today. With an archaeological career spanning over 25 years Adam is the founder of DIG International and has led and participated in expeditions to the Caribbean, British Isles, Jordan, Syria, Turkey and Australia.

Adam reckons there's no point in digging stuff up if the public don't get to hear about what it all means, so he is delighted to raise the profile of history and archaeology through his TV series, ABC's Who's Been Sleeping In My House? and his books, My Life In Ruins, and the school reader Digging Up The Past. Adam's most recent TV gig was the TV Series Lawless for Foxtel unearthing the truth behind Australia's most infamous bushranging legends.

In acknowledgement of his work Adam was recently honoured by being elected Fellow of the prestigious, Royal chartered and learned Society of Antiquaries of London
